

# Town seeking princess candidates

**A:** Simply being a candidate for Princess Kentville was an extremely valuable experience. It taught me professional skills, such as public speaking and how to con-

## Are you interested in being a candidate for Princess Kentville 2010?

Candidates must be between the ages of 18-23 and have been a resident of Kentville for at least one year. Candidates who are living away while attending school are still eligible, but must be available for all official Apple Blossom Festival events and a minimum of three functions over the course of the year. Candidates for Princess Kentville must adhere to the rules and regulations as set by the Apple Blossom Festival. The chosen candidate will receive accommodations at the Old Orchard Inn for the duration of the Apple Blossom Festival; participate in all official functions of the Festival; will compete for the title of Queen Annapolisa; and will receive a bursary from the Town of Kentville.

## Department updates

### PUBLIC WORKS

Public Works employees are busy maintaining streets and sidewalks in as safe a condition as possible with the variable weather conditions that occur throughout the year and especially during the winter.

The following is some of the Capital Construction work completed within the Town of Kentville in 2009:

- Completed paving sections of Prospect Avenue, McGill Court, Baden Powell Drive, Elizabeth Avenue, and trail from the Soccer Dome to West Main Street.
- Sidewalk has been added on Webster Street from Kings Riverside Court to the Church, as well as extending the Park Street sidewalk.
- School Street -- water and sewer is done and asphalt replaced.
- Completed the concrete curb and asphalt to open River Street (which is now open.)
- West Main Street – the underground work has been completed to extend waterlines and provide for storm sewer lines. The road reconstruction has been completed with the first layer of asphalt.
- West Main Pump Works - Pumps to pump water from West Main Storm Water have arrived and are scheduled to be installed in February and March of 2010.
- The Town has recently purchased a 1/2 -ton pickup truck, one-ton salt box, and three-ton salt box.

### BYLAWS/REGULATIONS

Winter Parking Regulations; Section 202(1) of the Motor Vehicle Act, effective December 1 until April 15, no person shall park upon any highway or street in the Town of Kentville from 1:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. This is strictly enforced during snow plowing operations and violators will have their vehicles towed.

The placement of snow from a driveway or parking lot onto Town streets is strictly forbidden.

### PARKS & RECREATION

Centennial Arena may be participating in a Capital Improvement Program including lighting and ceiling upgrades as well as a heat recovery system for the plant room. The project is subject to approval from Council, and would involve funding partners including RFANS, ecoNova Scotia, NSHPP and NSPI.

The Arena has hosted a variety of special events this season including a Figure Skating Ice Carnival, the Valley Open Figure Skating Competition, Valley Wildcat Playoffs and multiple hockey tournaments. March 28<sup>th</sup> is the last scheduled ice time for the Arena this winter, and of course the Home Show will take place in April.

The bridge that will eventually provide access to the Ducks Unlimited Trail from behind the Municipality of the County of Kings building has arrived. Work is currently being done to prepare for the installation of abut-

ments and the bridge is expected to be in place later this spring.

The department has been encouraging residents to Take the Roof Off Winter by engaging in fun outdoor activities this season. Burgher Hill, Oakdene Park and Memorial Park are all popular sites for sledding and are monitored regularly for safety issues and cleanliness. A community sledding party was held in January to promote outdoor winter physical activity.

The department is also promoting outdoor skating at Memorial Park and providing snowshoes to residents who wish to borrow them for use in the area.

### PLANNING

2009 saw a total year end building valuation of \$8,092,832. There were 16 single family residential dwellings and 1 semi-detached for a total of 18 dwelling units and a new commercial development – The Pharmasave and Office Building on Station Lane. The Planning Department and Council approved a rezoning request for approximately 7.5 acres of land on Chester for a single family and residential two unit dwelling subdivision; and a rezoning request from St. Joseph's Church to change the zoning on the property from Residential Two Unit Dwelling (R-2) to Institutional (I) to ensure conformity of the use.

Shannex's long term care facility is now open. The Town is moving ahead with designating River Street as a public street to open up vacant property adjacent to the Cornwallis River for commercial uses.

### WATER COMMISSION

The Kentville Water Commission Rate Hearing took place on Dec. 8 in Council Chambers. The process is anticipated to take a number of months with the implementation of new rates scheduled April 1, 2010.

## Snow removal takes time



Piles of snow like this one on Aberdeen Street are usually removed at night when there is less traffic on the roads and heavy equipment can move around easily.

It's that time of year again, when Kentville sees snow, snow and more snow! Here's a reminder of how the Town of Kentville's Public Works Department looks after the plowing, sanding, salting and maintenance of our roads.

There are two key points to remember when it comes to snow removal operations:

1. The Town of Kentville Public Works Department's number one priority is public safety. We will get the streets plowed and cleared of snow as soon as possible and when it is least disruptive.
2. The Town of Kentville Public Works Department does what it can, with what it has, when it can.

Often times the roads will be salted as the snow begins to fall so there is little or no accumulation. However, once there is a significant amount of snow on the ground, there is a priority system for snow plowing and salting/sanding roads.

Main thoroughfares and streets with steep grades are the top priority, followed by streets with a slight grade but

lightly traveled, and then flat, lightly traveled streets.

Although Public Works does not plow all sidewalks, it is standard procedure to clear some sidewalks along main thoroughfares and within the Downtown. Ultimately, it is the responsibility of property owners and occupiers of properties adjacent to sidewalks to keep them clear. In its plowing efforts, Public Works will also do its best to remove snow from parking lots to ensure there are as many available parking spaces as possible.

During snowstorms snow will be piled on Town streets to ensure the roads are passable. Crews do their best to pile snow in areas where there are no crosswalks and where there will be minimal impact on residents and local businesses, while maintaining public safety. Typically, piles are removed the same day, during the night when businesses are closed, there are few cars on the road, and the streets are safe. Heavy equip-

ment and dump trucks are used to remove hundreds of loads of snow, and contractors are hired to assist with the hauling and disposing of it.

It's also important to remember that during snow storms and snow removal operations, other incidents such as water main breaks can occur. Such incidents will take priority over snow removal operations and leave a skeleton crew available for plowing. So if your street doesn't get plowed right away, please be patient as there could be other circumstances delaying it.

Potholes are another concern and become increasingly worse due to freezing and thawing. The Public Works Department is aware of them and will work to repair them in a timely manner, once snow removal and other priority procedures are completed.

## Sustainability plan process ongoing

Throughout 2009 and early 2010, the Town of Kentville engaged in a community consultation and planning campaign called 'Envision Kentville: Planning for Tomorrow Today.'

Over the past year, Envision Kentville has broadly consulted with Kentville citizens of all ages, interests and backgrounds on the development of the Integrated Community Sustainability Plan (ICSP).

The ICSP is a long-term sustainability plan that identifies common community assets while recognizing common community challenges. The ICSP lays out the town's sustainability priorities as well as the actions and timelines that are required to protect and enhance the Town's sense of place and quality of life.

By 2030, the Town of Kentville will strive towards the popularly supported vision of "Becoming a healthy, vibrant, integrated and complete community where citizens can live, work and play in an environment that supports a high quality of life."

In meeting this vision, the Town will face the challenges, and the potential to embrace new opportunities, in building on existing community assets in a way that addresses the sustainability issues of common concern. Ultimately, the success of the ICSP rests on the Town's abilities to balance the four pillars of sustainability – economic, social, cultural and environmental – and to do so through ongoing and meaningful processes of civic engagement.

Some of the key goals and priorities of the ICSP, in no particular order, include:

- Building on Kentville's role as the service centre of the valley while encouraging diversity and entrepreneurship in the

local economy

- Supporting good infrastructure planning, policies & practices in traffic & parking, that maximizes efficiency and minimizes costs while,

- Encouraging a pedestrian friendly, active living community with integrated trail connectivity to support active transportation (i.e. walking, jogging, cycling)

- Working with regional partners to protect agricultural farmland and the rural nature of the Valley while working to support the local agricultural economy

- Working with regional partners to clean up & restore the Cornwallis River

- Ensuring a safe, clean and reliable water supply & protecting Town water resources through proactive measures

- Continuing to enhance regional collaboration on the provision of public transit & waste management services

- Supporting local, regional & provincial collaboration to reduce greenhouse gases & air pollution

- Supporting regional approaches to climate impacts & adaptation planning (i.e. flooding, sea level rise & extreme weather events)

- Managing sustainable community growth & development through planning & policy

- Promoting downtown revitalization

- Encouraging the diversification of community recreation, arts & culture, green spaces & facilities

## Town states position on education funding, proposed tri-government complex

After 27 years of honouring an agreement to cost-share mandatory municipal contributions to education equally with the towns, Kings County Council has applied to the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia to have the Court impose a termination clause of March 31, 2010 in the agreement. This action is unprecedented both in its adverse effect on inter-municipal cooperation and by trying to make the Supreme Court a party to an agreement that was reached by local governments.

Education funding is one agreement among many inter-municipal funding and service arrangements we rely on to ensure each municipality pays a fair share and that services are available to the public regardless of the political jurisdiction they live, work, learn and play in.

Presently, the County of Kings and the Towns of Kentville, Wolfville, Berwick and Hantsport all pay \$1,252 per student to the Annapolis Valley Regional School Board. If Kings County Council is successful in having the Supreme Court terminate the education funding agreement, Kentville's cost per student will increase \$300 and Kings County's will drop by \$100. This will increase Kentville's total cost by \$230,000 per year. Put another way, it would have the same effect as Kentville paying for 185 Kings County students under the agreement that has served the region so equitably since 1982.

Regarding the proposed Kings County Tri-Government Complex, we are very concerned that anyone is proposing to move so many government services out of our downtown. We are also disappointed about an apparent lack of concern about the devastating impact this would have on our downtown. Like so many downtowns in Canada, downtown Kentville has had to redefine itself over many years as "big box" retail stores have sprung up and expanded outside our borders.

The County of Kings municipal complex is a cornerstone of our downtown and vitally important to Kentville, which has become the government, professional and business service centre of Kings County and the Annapolis Valley. Kentville is also at the heart of the urban core of Kings County, which includes Coldbrook, North Kentville, New Minas and other immediately adjacent communities. This area, with Kentville at its centre, recently rated #1 in Nova Scotia and #17 in Canada in the Canadian Federation of Independent Business "Communities in Boom" report on the best places to do business.

We are proud of the prominence and success of Kentville-Kings and certain that we are even stronger, more prosperous and vibrant when we work together and not a cross purposes to one another. We firmly believe that the council and residents of the Municipality of the County of Kings will be well-served by reinvesting in their existing municipal complex rather spending much more money to build something new where there are no services.
