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Recreation space development will complement new school

The removal of tanks from the former Superior Propane site last month was the last step in the road to getting the new KCA School open as scheduled for the start of this school year. Teachers, students and administrators are now moved into the new state of the art building, but the school itself is just the first piece in the execution of a redevelopment plan for the surrounding site. Work continues around school grounds that will eventually culminate in a new soccer field, walking trails, green space, signage, fencing, parking and of course the new playground.

“The overall goal of the project is to create space that will not only support the school environment and the needs of KCA, but also accommodate the growing recreational needs of the community”, says Town CAO Mark Phillips. The soccer community in the area continues to grow, people are more interested in active transportation, and having activities to do outdoors with their families is important to our residents.

The trail work is being done in hopes to encourage residents to use active transportation to get to and from the school and recreational spaces. The Kentville trail system allows people to travel safely walking or running, by bike or skateboard, and in the winter time with snowshoes or on skis. People can access the school site by way of the trail all the way from the downtown core, or from the west end of Town. Portions of the trail have been paved to

accommodate persons in wheelchairs, or with walkers, and to make it easier for families with strollers.

The playground project is an important one to the members of the school’s PTA and its playground committee, who have been busy raising funds for the past year. At press time the tendering process was underway for an accessible space that caters to the unique or special needs some children may have. The playground will serve as a school playground, but be open for community use during off hours.

At this time, the Town’s two main priorities for the recreational space surrounding the school are completion of the playground installation and preparation work for the new soccer field on West Main Street. Work on the recreational space will follow a step by step process which will include clearing the site, further decommissioning of the former superior land including removal of concrete, asphalt and any remaining infrastructure, leveling the site, and eventually the playground installation. Grading and drainage work in preparation for the new soccer field is also expected to be carried out this season, with grass, sod, fencing and irrigation work planned for next year.

The additions and improvements will complement the already existing three outdoor soccer fields, running track, three softball fields, outdoor pool, full size baseball diamond and tennis courts that make up the

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Spotlight on business: Weavexx celebrates 50 years

Weavexx in Kentville is celebrating 50 years in operation this fall. The Kentville location, which first opened in October of 1961 under the name "Formex" has seen many changes, progress and growth over the years.

The plant, which currently employs 152 people, makes products used by the pulp and paper industry. Since the beginning, the plant has grown from 7,900 to 14,500 square meters in size and has retooled some of its major equipment 5 times.

"We are very excited about celebrating this milestone," says research and development manager Kevin Ward. "We don't celebrate enough; and after 50 years, we really do have a lot to be proud of".

Over the years, Weavexx has supported various charities including the Canadian Cancer Society and the Heart and Stroke Foundation. They make donations to the Valley Regional Hospital's Festival of Lights fundraiser, the Apple Blossom Festival Booster Club, and have participated in the

Planning and development

Development within the Town of Kentville continues to be steady in 2011. The year has seen the issuance of 75 permits for a total building valuation of \$9,618,745. Much of this is due to a resurgence of infill and higher density developments, which were identified as a key goal of the integrated community development plan, and the proposed Kings 2050 initiative.

New apartments and semi-detached housing in Kentville will meet the demand for rental housing which is increasing across the Province due to the changing demographics. Our aging population no longer need or want the trials of single family home ownership. These “empty nesters” are looking to downsize, and are increasing the demand for apartment and condominium units. In fact, the seniors housing market is fast becoming an important component of residential development activity in Kentville due in part to our proximity to the Valley Regional Hospital

and, the various government and financial services in our downtown. Kentville can expect continued demand for multi-unit dwelling housing.

Kings 2050

Many of you may have heard of Kings 2050, an exciting partnership under review by all four Municipalities within Kings County intended to guide the long term sustainable development of Kings County. This will be a comprehensive, regional planning approach embracing smart growth principles such as directing development towards existing communities already served by infrastructure; preservation of critical environmental areas, open space and farm lands. The first phase will be in developing, through a transparent and inclusive public consultation, a vision for the future of Kings County.



Much-needed work

Webster Court is getting a facelift! Business and property owners on Webster Court have been patiently anticipating the completion of the capital project currently underway on the street which consists of the installation of a new asphalt roadway, sidewalks and curbs for the street as well as the addition of ornamental lighting. At the time of print, the street was closed to through traffic as workers installed conduits and light bases. The gravel had already been placed on the roadway and curbing was well underway. A new set of steps and small retaining wall will be installed prior to the new concrete sidewalks going in. At the time of printing, work was still on schedule to be complete by the end of the month.

A recent meeting was held at the Indoor Soccer Facility in Kentville to discuss plans for an exciting upcoming Guinness World Record attempt.

Event Coordinator Kendall Hogeborne spoke enthusiastically of his dream to break the current Guinness world record for the longest marathon 5 aside indoor soccer game ever played.

With help from The Valley District Soccer Association, the Valley Referees Association and the Town of Kentville, Kendall plans to take his best shot on October 8th, 9th and 10th at the indoor facility in Kentville.

Kendall and his committee are in the middle stages of planning and fundraising for the event. The timing will put the attempt near the end of the 125th Anniversary year for Kentville.

“It really is a wonderful thing to have happening in Kentville during the 125th year,” says Mayor David Corkum.

Currently, the group is still looking for sponsors, which are vital to the success of an attempt of this nature. All proceeds raised from the attempt will be donated to KidSport Nova Scotia, a national children’s program that helps kids overcome the financial barriers preventing or limiting their participation in organized sport.

The event will be held at the indoor facility in Kentville, supported by VDEC, and logistical and promotional support will be provided by the Town of Kentville. The Town of Kentville recently issued a formal request for assistance from the World Protection Agency* of Super Heroes, Citizen Protectors and Sidekicks.
